This year's School to Work program kicked off in October of 2021 with nearly 90 students from across Palm Beach and Martin Counties. These high-school-aged Littles attended a series of workshops to boost their career readiness skills, including resume writing, public speaking, and interviewing techniques. Along with the help of their Bigs, students completed exercises and learned skills to help prepare them for the next phase of their lives.

Then in June, after months of hard work, our Littles hit the road each week to engage with dozens of professionals in a variety of fields ranging from theater and education to the law and the environment. At Palm Beach Dramaworks, they got to peek behind the curtain and learn what goes into creating live theater productions. At Grainger, Littles worked with one of our agency's Bigs, Armand who asked the students to work on team-building exercises, to think about where they wanted to be in 10 years, how they would find their passions and give back to their community. continued on page 3

With the help of Board member Dr. Mary White, the Martin County School District played host to a large group of Littles who had the opportunity to learn what is involved in preparing lessons, teaching a class, and more. Fifteen-year-old Little, Alondra was so inspired that she signed up to be a Summer School volunteer in her very own first-grade teacher's class, Mrs. Adams, and is interested in pursuing a teaching career.

When it came time to learn about a career in the law, the Florida Justice Association Minority Caucus invited students to the Manatee Lagoon in West Palm Beach. The Florida Justice Association lawyers opened by asking who in the room "felt their light flicker when they thought about a legal career?" While no one initially raised their hand, Ben B. (17) ended the day on a perfect note when he told the group, "I think my light is flickering."

The City of Lake Worth offered a glimpse into what it takes to run a city. From the administrative clerks to the courts, our Littles got to see it all; but it was when they visited the firefighters that the magic happened. During an equipment demonstration, Brian O. (17) got to take control of a firehose, and there could be no mistaking the sparkle in his eye. Brian had found something to ignite his passion.

The best part of running the STW program is watching the students learn and grow from their experiences. They typically start off shy, then something magical happens. The School to Work roster ended with a visit to the Florida Oceanographic Society in Stuart. There, Littles learned about the environment and the importance of ecopreservation in Florida. They finished the day making seagrass mats to help restore seagrass meadows in the Indian River Lagoon.

Now that School to Work 21-22 is wrapping up and graduation is just around the corner, many STW Littles are applying their new skills in the real world. They are out in the community taking proactive steps towards getting jobs, applying for college, enlisting in the military, and more. With the help of their Bigs and our extraordinary STW team, this group of kids has done the work and gained skills to set them apart from others in their peer group. It is our mission at BBBS to inspire and defend the potential of every child, but it's our Littles who inspire us.
